

Salmon in the Classroom

The Environmental team is gearing up for another round of salmon classes at the Skagway school, which means our aquarium is up and running! This year we've included some of the other organisms important for healthy salmon habitat in the tank, including the macroinvertebrates that provide food for juvenile salmon and keep the water clean by grazing on decaying matter. Caddisflies, mayflies, stoneflies, and hydras not only provide these services for the stream ecosystem, but also help scientists gauge how clean the water is – these charismatic stream bugs are intolerant of pollution and will only be present in a healthy stream (or aquarium!).

Rain Gardens and the BEACH Program

STC was awarded two new competitive grants from the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation's (DEC) Alaska Clean Water Actions programs!

Rain Gardens

In response to Skagway School 4th and 5th graders' request for more rain gardens to save our urban salmon streams, STC will be leading an effort to design and install green stormwater infrastructure in locations around Skagway. Students will help to calculate rain garden dimensions, find priority locations for installation, and fill the rain gardens with native plants, as well as improve the existing rain gardens on 11th avenue.

BEACH Program

While recreation on beaches in Skagway doesn't usually include sunbathing or surfing, Skagway residents and visitors come into contact with marine waters through activities such as beach combing, dog walking, kayaking, and stand-up-paddleboarding. Concerns over high bacteria loads in the summertime prompted environmental staff to complete a beach survey for DEC's Beaches Environmental Assessment and Coast Health (BEACH) program to determine whether marine pathogens are posing a risk to recreational beach users. Skagway was selected to participate in a monitoring program during 2023-24 and will be collecting water samples for weekly testing during the summer months. Additionally, data collected will be available to the community, public service announcements will be issued in case of exceedances, and STC will provide outreach for interested beachgoers about healthy nearshore marine ecosystems.
