On December 13th, Jaime Bricker delivered her first Cultural Host Training Seminar to a sold-out room! Several members of Jaime's family were able to attend, and she said that it made the experience very special on a multi-generational level.

Her grandmother, Lorna McDermott, helped Bricker end the class by sharing "The Story of How Mosquitos Came to Be". It was a story that Bricker has carried with her since childhood and the class participants really loved her theatrics!

"Hearing from an Alaska Native what are the values, messages, and the status of culture preservation. Also, I liked the time management. I like the pace."


"Practical information about how we (non-native people) can be advocates (ex. Land acknowledgements, Tlingit language, etc.)"

Stormwater Outreach

Also featuring John Hudson, we invited the 4th and 5th grade classes to our building for a demonstration. To start off, we located the storm grates along our road and mapped out where we thought they led to. Then, we poured in a dyed powder to follow along. It took a minute to make it through the leaf blockade at the exit, but when it did, the kids were surprised how far down the river the dye was traceable. Goes to show how much influence just one parking lot grate can have on a river system.





Salmon In The Classroom

BUGS! Guest-starring bug expert John Hudson. We brought a bucket of Pullen creek water filled with bugs to the classrooms to get a closer look at what lives in the streams with the salmon. Bugs have the same basic necessities as salmon, so looking at them can be a good way to gauge river health. Together, we learned the three most common species of caddisfly, stonefly, and mayfly; and then fed our findings to our tank!



Swim-Up

Our salmon have completed their swim up and are finally in their final stage before release at the end of the month! Late to the party, it looks like our rocks we had in the tank were just too effective at providing cover and our fry did not feel the need to leave its protection and swim up to get their gulps of air. With the rocks removed, we're back on schedule to close out our 2023/2024 season of Salmon in the Classroom!

NEW NAME: Héen Agunataani Táay

PRONUNCIATION: It sound very much like how it is written.

TRANSLATION: Whitecaps on the Water Garden

SIGNIFICANCE: Skagway Traditional Council's traditional house name is Heen Agunataani Hit (Hit means House and Taay means Garden/Farm)

The council selected this to keep and use the unique identity of the Skagway's Tribal Government.

ARTISTS (Any artists professional or not, children or adults): If interested in providing a logo design for the farm, please let us know. The Logo should be easily replicated and scaled as needed from small items such as pens all the way to the signage for the Farm. The logo should translate the goals and values of the farm and traditional council: Stewards of the Land, Food sovereignty, Inclusiveness, Multi-cultural (Skagway Traditional Council citizen bodies include as much as 7 various indigenous groups).

*Please note artists who submitted the selected art will need to sign a waiver of copy rights.

Last 30 days of income verification: if you or anyone on the application (18 years or older) is employed. please provide copies of all income that is received for the prior month.

If you receive social security, SSI, APA, TANF, food stamps or general assistance, please send a copy of your most recent award letter. If you receive food stamps, a recent award letter that shows countable income can be used to determine your eligibility.

A copy of your fuel/oil, electric, and propane bills is required to process your application. If heat is included in your rent, please provide a copy of your rental agreement and rent receipt. If you live in subsidized housing, please attach a copy of your rental housing worksheet.
